Charlotte County has launched an upgraded version of the Charlotte County FL app that is now available for download from the Apple iTunes app store and the Android Google Play store. The app is full of features allowing residents to access county officials and services, report a variety of issues and locate information on the counties' calendar and social media channels.

Users who already have the Charlotte County FL app on their phone or tablets must download the new app to submit requests and report issues. Residents who have submitted questions or service requests, via the old app, with be contacted with information about their submissions and instructions for downloading the new app.

Residents can continue to submit service requests or report issues on the county website by clicking the Contact Us button.

The free app allows users to take a picture or video of issues such as potholes, trash or code violations, add a message and send it directly to the proper county department. The application uses geo-location technology to automatically provide the problem's location, simplifying the reporting process for users.
