# **County earns Center for Digital Government award**

Charlotte County earned a Digital Counties Survey award from the Center for Digital Government and the National Association of Counties. The survey identifies the best county technology practices, including initiatives that streamline government services, encourage collaboration and shared services, enhance cybersecurity and contribute to disaster response and recovery efforts.

## Sales tax vote set for Nov. 3

A referendum is on the ballot this fall regarding extending the 1% local option sales tax for six years. This is not a new tax. It has been approved

Port Charlotte Beach, South County and Tringali parks are now open with modified programming opportunities that incorporate social distancing.





#### **Transit COVID Operations**


Transit operations have been heavily impacted by COVID. Ridership has dropped by 60%-70% and procedures have changed to accommodate social distancing and continual disinfecting.

An upside to this lull is that it has given us an opportunity to upgrade software and pilot a new routing module. Since June over 90% of scheduled trips were able to be electonically "optimized", meaning that the software was able to place the trip on the appropriate route leaving less than 10% to be done manually. The graph below displays the introduction of optimization as well as the continuity of ontime performance.



## **Facilities Construction & Maintenance**

#### **Recent Accomplishments**

◆ William R. Gaines Jr. Veterans Memorial Park reached 95% construction completion. The project is expected to be finalized next month.



 Facilities provided sneeze guards for the Emergency Operations Center situation room and Public Information area to prepare for activation during Hurricane Laura and future storms or emergencies. Sneeze guard placement provides safety and social distancing so emergency operations can continue during the pandemic.



### **Building B Restrooms**

Plumbing repairs were completed in the Murdock Building B first floor men's and women's restrooms. Toilet and urinal fixtures were replaced and areas impacted by repairs during the project were repaired. Acoustical ceilings were replaced and ceiling lights retrofitted to LED. All Murdock Building B restrooms were evaluated for potential additional improvements that will be completed by inhouse technicians.

### **Forward Progress**

- Wharton Smith was selected as the Construction Manager at Risk for relocation of the JB Public Works Yard. This selection will go for Board approval on September 8th.
- ◆ The new Charlotte County Transit Facility, located off Veterans Blvd. near the county fueling station (JB Yard), is at 50% construction design.
- New doors were installed between Murdock Buildings A & B with painting to be completed on the replacement project.
- The sales tax funded supplemental backup generator installation at the Justice Center is substantially complete. This generator is anticipated



to be fully functional in September to supply power in the event of an outage.




#### **Notable Happenings**

- ◆ FY21 Capital Maintenance Projects (CMP) were evaluated with the contractor. They are preparing the Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) for Board approval in October.
- ◆ Public Safety Building UPS replacement equipment was relocated for storage at the jail. The UPS replacement was delayed until after storm patterns break.
- ◆ Two facility supervisor positions were filled with internal promotions, leaving a project coordinator and senior maintenance technician position vacant. A maintenance technician and building control specialist were also hired into the Facilities team during August.









# **Public Safety**







### Life Goes On

Public Safety does not rest, and that has been evident through this pandemic. Emergency Management and Fire & EMS have stayed extremely busy, and many of our staff have even seen their workload and responsibilities increase. But one area that was scaled back was the training schedule. Many of the training events were canceled as a safety precaution until best practices procedures were established and put into place to keep folks safe.

In August, Fire & EMS Marine Operations hosted a boat operator search and rescue course (BOSAR) with the classroom portion in the headquarters training room and the hands-on part on Charlotte Harbor. The class was taught by the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA), which is recognized by the US Coast Guard as the national standard of training.

The five-day BOSAR course was a mixture of classroom and hands-on training on Charlotte Harbor. The course establishes a uniform and standardized understanding of maritime rescue operations and provides the skills necessary to execute missions safely. "The BOSAR course provides our marine ops team advanced training in boat search and rescue operations. As graduates, we recognized by FEMA and United States Coast Guard," said Marine Operations Battalion Chief Chris Mott.

Adoption and implementation of NASBLA's BOSAR course and training provide a national standard for maritime interoperability at all government levels, ensuring that maritime agencies can interact together and bolster their ability to act as force multipliers across the country.

Marine operations teams from CCFEMS, Ft. Myers FD, Ft. Myers Shore FD, Boca Grande FD, Charlotte County Sheriffs Office, Venice PD, and the FWC sent members to receive the BOSAR training.



## In the Works

A major stormwater ditch was reclaimed at Eastport off Old Landfill Rd. in Port Charlotte. This is to enhance the drainage for the Loveland & Olean area.





## Did You Know

Here is the newest addition to the Public Works family. A 2020 Volvo EW 60E wheeled mini excavator – one of two in Southwest Florida. The other located in Davie, Florida. These are designed to take the place of a backhoe and teamed with our mini loader, the pair can do just about anything!



## Working Together

In mid-July, contractor, Marine Contracting Group began maintenance dredging for the Manchester Maintenance Dredge project. MCG is currently dredging out in shoal 1 and shoals 2a and





2b in the Ackerman access channel. Clean material is being placed as submerged beneficial use in the Humphrey Basin and unsuitable material is being off loaded at the county upland site and will be hauled off to the county landfill.



Charlotte BMX Track at Carmalita Park This regional event attracted 345 participants plus family members from all over the State of Florida as well as 7 other states. The event generated an estimated \$541,027 in total economic impact and approximately 550 hotel room nights.

The booster station will increase potable water pressure to West County at the Myakka River and the vacuum station will provide sewer collection for the El Jobean Septic to Sewer Project.

• Cape Haze Dr. Wastewater and **Reclaimed Transmission System:** 

This project is upsizing the existing 6" sewer lines to 12" on Cape Haze Dr. and adding new 16" reclaimed lines for future customers.



 Deep Creek Force Main Replacement:

Construction of a larger force main to improve transmission capacity for the Deep Creek neighborhood. This project also includes pumping improvements at several lift stations along the project route.
