Administration

Charlotte County ranks 11th in Milken Institute Index

The Punta Gorda-Charlotte County Metropolitan Statistical Area was ranked 11th in the 2021 Milken Institute Best-Performing Cities Index. The MSA moved from 39th to 11th from 2020 to 2021. The index is based on jobs, wages, and high-tech growth, housing affordability and household broadband access. The MSA's strongest results were in one-year wage growth (eighth) and short-

term jobs growth (fourth). It was one of the handful of MSAs to see positive year-on-year jobs growth. The institute cited the county's "careful planning and investments [that] have led to improved local amenities."

"It's gratifying to see Charlotte County's efforts succeed in creating an economic climate where

large and small businesses can thrive, while maintaining affordability and public safety for our residents," said Charlotte County Administrator Hector Flores.

The institute also recognized the county's strategic planning and investments in public amenities and infrastructure through the 1% sales tax.

Sunseeker Resort construction resumes

Staff from the county's Public Information Office, visitor's bureau and Office of Economic Development attended an Aug. 3 news conference where Allegiant Airlines President John Redmond announced the resumption of construction on Sunseeker Resorts Charlotte Harbor.

The project will feature three towers with 512 hotel rooms and 273 long-term suites, Redmond said. It will also have 55,000 square feet of meeting and event space, rooftop and ground-level pools, 19 bars and restaurants and a boardwalk overlooking the Peace River from the Gilchrist Bridge to Bayshore Live Oak Park.

The boardwalk and 18 of the bars and restaurants will be open to the public. A second phase of the development will include lodging and retail space on the northern part of the 27-acre property near a planned 5,000 square-foot pool, Redmond said.


Charlotte County launch its new TikTok account Aug. 6.

to target a younger demographic with messaging about county events, jobs and news," said Communications Manager Brian Gleason.






Sunseeker Resumes Construction

EDO Director Dave Gammon got a sneak peak at construction on Allegiant's Sunseeker Resort during a press conference held by Allegiant President John Redmond. Sunseeker aims to welcome its first guests as early as 2023. The resort will consist of three towers. The main building will host a 55,000 square feet meeting and event space that overlooks Charlotte Harbor and the Peace River, a spa and fitness center, 512 hotel rooms, a promenade and roof-top pool. The first floor promenade will be open to the public and will host 18 unique-concept restaurants and bars along with retail stores. The other two towers will hold over 180 extended stay suites. The resort will also host a 200 slip marina and a 300 foot pool that in future phases will be 1,000 feet; making it the largest pool in Florida. Allegiant is also renovating Kingsway Golf Course in Lake Suzy. The golf course will open at the same time as the hotel and will be open to members and resort guests. Between 700—800 constructions workers will soon be busy at the site and when it opens Sunseeker will have 1,150 employees, making it the third largest employer in the area. It is so exciting to see this project underway again!

Port Charlotte Library



The Port Charlotte Library Renovation project was conducted over a four (4) week period which included carpet and cove base replacement on the first floor. Carpet was also replaced on both stairways along with the installation of new ADA approved handrails. Luxury vinvl flooring was installed in the large print room, first floor restroom, and maintenance room. The entire first floor was painted including all closets and doors. In addition, a new circulation desk was installed along with two new modular oval pods. New book stacks were installed and reconfigured on the first floor providing open space in the center area of the library to promote social distancing. The staff area on the first floor was also painted, carpeted, and reconfigured for efficiency.







Family Services Center to Open

Phase 1 of the Family Services Center (FSC) is set to open in the Parkside Neighborhood by the end of September. The Neighborhood and Intake Services Divisions will be the first to move in August and will quickly be joined by six other local organizations or agencies: The Boys & Girls Club, Charlotte Behavioral Health, Charlotte County Sheriff, Jewish Family and Children's Services, Florida Department of Health, Charlotte Alliance for a Safe and Drug Free Community and The Hearing Impaired Persons of Charlotte County. The concept behind the FSC is to offer a shared vision, common intake process, defined, shared roles and collective outcomes that will ensure efficient, effective and successful delivery of services to County residents in need of support. Through collaboration, each organization will strenthen their individual missions and further the collective vision for a healthy, vibrant Charlotte County.



Hurricane Season

Public Safety started the month of July preparing for possible impacts from Hurricane Elsa. History shows Hurricane Elsa as the strongest July hurricane recorded in the Caribbean since the 2005 Hurricane Emily. Thankfully, Elsa moved past our county in the Gulf of Mexico on a parrel track to our state and our area suffered only a few minor effects.

Elsa served as a good exercise for Emergency Management and our county as a whole. The Emergency Operation Center was staffed with decision-makers from all county departments and partnering agencies. For any storm, if it is severe, those who report to the EOC are ready to stay around the clock if necessary. That way, the decision-makers for the entire county are in the same room and can quickly and efficiently make vital decisions in their area of expertise for the good of the entire county.

In July, Public Safety Director and Chief of Charlotte County Fire & EMS returned from working in the collapsed condominium high rise in Miami's Surfside community. Chief Fair served as the Urban Search and Rescue Division supervisor because of his experience in search and rescue during Hurricanes Michael and Dorian.

Chief Fair was able to do national television interviews on both the Today Show and CNBC with Shepard Smith. He also shared his experience with a few of our local media partners.





In the Works

Our Traffic Signs and Marking team is installing new raised pavement markers (RPMs) along Prospect Avenue after a recent change to double solid yellow road markings. This change to Prospect Ave denotes that passing is prohibited in both directions of travel.





Did You Know

On Saturday, July 24, Public Works held a job fair at the Charlotte Harbor Event & Conference Center. They had an excellent turnout with 48 people in attendance. Public Works received 12 applications and filled five temporary positions. Additionally, there were 28 applications submitted for positions in other departments.




