

## Managing Charlotte County's Long-Term Hurricane Recovery

Charlotte County is only five months out from Hurricane Ian devastating wide swaths of the community, but your local government, its residents and business community are making fantastic strides in their recoveries. That said, there is much work to be done. Numerous county facilities, parks, libraries and equipment remain offline as we navigate issues, such as insurance, scopes of work, material delays and more. It will likely be years before we are fully recovered, so we ask for your continued patience as we navigate this unprecedented challenge.

County staff last week met with representatives from multiple state and federal agencies that are part of the Interagency Recovery Coordination group. The IRC provides a strategic and national approach to lead, manage and coordinate recovery efforts while increasing the resilience of communities. The IRC consists of six recovery support functions, each led by a designated fed-



#### eral agency.

The functions are economic, housing, health and social services, natural and cultural resources, community planning and capacity building and infrastructure systems. The county is also working with the state Division of Emergency Management to explore grant opportunities to improve the resiliency of our community.

There are numerous facilities that suffered such severe damage. It may be many months or even years before they reopen, if at all. Damage to the Utilities Department administration building at the East Port Environmental Campus forced staff from multiple departments and agencies to relocate immediately to an alternate facilities. The Mid-County Library had to be completely emptied to preserve as many materials as possible and allow mitigation work to occur.

There is no magic wand to wave that would get everything back to normal today or tomorrow or even a few months from now. Recovery takes time. Patience can wear thin at times, but know that my colleagues and I are working hard every day to shorten the road to recovery and prevent future storms from hurting us so badly.

### Commission wants progress on Cultural Center

During a recent County Commission workshop, the board discussed the status of the Cultural Center property and what the county can do to meet unmet needs in the community since the center closed. The unanimous consensus was that the county should begin planning for a new facility immediately and identify funding sources and opportunities on a parallel track.

Commissioners expressed their gratitude to the Charlotte Community Foundation

for its report identifying programs and services the center provided and feedback from the public about its expectations.

Damage to the former Cultural Center building was so extensive, it will need to replaced. How much it costs will depend on what gets built. Public input sessions wil be part of the planning process, and we expect there will be substantial interest from the public when we ask for input in the coming months.

This is the time of year when brush fiures spark up. With low humidity, dry conditions and windy weather, it pays to be careful. No burn ban is in place, but may be soon.







#### **Charlotte County Chamber Business Expo**





# **CHARLOTTE COUNTY** Facilities Construction & Maintenance



Hurricane Ian repairs continue at multiple sites throughout the county. The buildback of the Cedar Point Environment Center began. Repairs to the fascia, flooring, insulation, and the cupola are completed. The remaining repairs will be done upon receipt of the proper permits. At Charlotte Sports Park, temporary air conditioning units were installed in preparation for construction to begin. Requests for proposal by geographical region (West, Mid, and South County) were solicited for qualified firms to provide professional Construction Manager at Risk services as part of hurricane damage recovery.

#### The Southwest Florida Water Management District and the Army Corps of Engineers approved the grass parking project at Bayshore





Park. The project is awaiting Site Plans Review approval before beginning construction.


Fencing around the construction site was installed by Florida Premier Contractors for the safety of our community.

## **Brush Fire Prevention**

The U.S. Department of the Interior says that nine out of ten wildfires are started by humans. The good news? Nine out of ten wildfires can be prevented. We are just getting into our driest season in southwest Florida, which means a small wildfire will grow and spread quickly.

Now is the best time to use common sense whenever open flames or other heat sources are used near the woods. While we have not had substantial rainfall for several weeks, it may get even drier. Whether or not the county imposes a burn ban is up to the discretion of Charlotte County Fire & EMS Chief Jason Fair. One factor Chief Fair utilizes to decide if a ban is necessary is the Keetch-Byram Drought Index (KBDI), a continuous reference scale estimating the dryness of the soil and upper duff layers. The index increases each day without rain and decreases when it rains. Higher values of the KBDI are an indication that the conditions are favorable for the occurrence and spread of brushfires. Once Charlotte County nears the 650 range on the KBDI, Chief Fair considers banning any open burning.

During a brushfire, Charlotte County Fire & EMS crews work first to protect lives and then to protect property. While protecting property is a high priority, if you have woods surrounding your home, you should help us by creating a defensible space. Clear a 25-foot, brush-free buffer around your house and regularly remove leaves and debris from gutters and roofs, so blowing embers don't land in them and become a fire. If you see a fire starting, get to a safe








#### **UNDER CONSTRUCTION**

- SR 776 Sewer Force Main Project: Upsizing the existing sewer force main to 12-inch and 16-inch lines along SR 776 from Biscayne Dr. to the Charlotte Sports Park. This is an in-kind project for the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) Consent Order. This project is expected to be complete by spring 2023.
- Ackerman Septic to Sewer Project: Construction of a wastewater system to service approximately 2,135 properties with sewer service. Zones 1. 2 and the vacuum station are currently underway. The vacuum station is expected to be complete by spring 2023. Zones 1 and 2 sewer connections are expected to begin after vacuum station completion. For project information: AckermanProject.com

#### • Lake View/Midway Septic to Sewer **Project:**

This project proposes construction of a wastewater collection system to service approximately 1,500 properties with sewer service, new water service lines and a vacuum station. Septic tank location letters have been sent out to properties located within the project area. Please complete these forms and return in the self-addressed envelope provided.

 Cochran Reclaim Project: Construction of reclaim water mains along the right-of-way of Cochran Blvd. from Quesada Ave. to Peachland Blvd. Due to design changes construction has halted and is expected to resume within the next few months.
