




Annual Cumulative Ridership


Annual Utility Rate Model Update

Fiscal Services and Charlotte County Utilities worked diligently with the Utilities Rate consultant, Raftelis, early this year preparing the annual Utility model. Fiscal Services and the Utilities provided historical data, debt schedules, project updates, and current projections in order for the rate consultant to use the most up-to-date information. This year's model was impacted increased capital improvement projects and an upcoming bond issuance with days of cash and debt service being of priority. The model was presented to the BCC on June 20th. In addition to the model's base case scenario, the Commissioners were provided three additional scenarios for review and consideration. Approved at the quarterly Utilities meeting was an increase in staffing per the Utilities man power study and the indexing of rate revenues by the Florida Public Service Commission (FPSC) Index.



A \$100 BILLION WEALTH MIGRATION TILTS US ECONOMY SOUTHWARD

The US's Four Dominant High-Growth Regions Are in the South


Domestic migration is the main driver




The numbers tell the story. For the first time, six fast-growing states in the South – Florida, Texas, Georgia, the Carolinas and Tennessee – are contributing more to the national GDP than the Northeast, with its Washington-New York-Boston corridor, in government figures going back to the 1990s. The switch happened during the pandemic and shows no signs of reverting.

A flood of transplants helped steer about \$100 billion in new income to the Southeast in 2020 and 2021 alone, while the Northeast bled out about \$60 billion, based on an analysis of recently published Internal Revenue Service data. The Southeast accounted for more than two-thirds of all job growth across the U.S. since early 2020, almost doubling its pre-pandemic share. And it was home to 10 of the 15 fastest-growing American large cities. Read the full article <u>HERE</u>.

Ann & Chuck Dever Regional Park Pool Repair- An estimated 6,500 gallons of water per day was leaking from the expansion joints at the pool. To prevent further damage and degradation of the pool shell, the repair was expedited, and the repair was completed ahead of schedule through planning and focused investigation with minimal shutdown time.



Englewood Beach Parking Lot Lighting– all rusted parking lot light fixtures were replaced with energyefficient amber LEDs.

The contractor installed a temporary chiller at the Family Services Center, allowing work to continue on the installation of



interior finishes while awaiting the permanent chiller.


 The new 20,286 sf CCSO District 4 office located on Airport Road is in the final permitting stage of the project. The Guaranteed Maximum Price with the CM @ Risk contractor Wharton-Smith Inc. is scheduled for Board review and approval on September 12th. The project is expected to start in early October 2023, with a build period of approximately 12 months.


The Landfill Scale House project improves flow in and out of the landfill and



Staying Safe in the Scorching Heat As the sweltering heat of summer tries its best to keep us indoors, understanding how to stay safe in the heat is

paramount. Here are some essential tips to help you navigate through the scorching days:

Drink plenty of water throughout the day, even if you don't feel thirsty. Avoid excessive consumption of caffeine and alcohol, as they can contribute to dehydration. Dress in lightweight, loose-fitting, and light-colored clothing. This helps your body breathe and reflects the sun's rays, preventing excess heat absorption. If possible, schedule outdoor activities during cooler parts of the day, such as early mornings or evenings. The sun's intensity is at its peak between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m., so try to avoid prolonged exposure during these hours. When outdoors, take advantage of shaded areas to escape direct sunlight. This simple step can significantly reduce your risk of heat-related illnesses. Protect your skin from harmful UV rays by using a broad-spectrum sunscreen with a high SPF. Sunburn impairs your body's ability to regulate temperature, increasing the risk of heat-related illnesses. Cool down by using fans, air conditioning, or take cool showers to lower your body temperature. Placing a damp cloth on your forehead or the back of your neck can provide instant relief.

Make sure you keep a close a close eye on children, the elderly, and those with pre-existing medical conditions. They are more susceptible to heat-related illnesses and may require additional assistance. Educate yourself about the symptoms of heat exhaustion and heatstroke. These include heavy sweating, dizziness, nausea, confusion, rapid pulse, and hot, dry skin. If you or someone around you exhibits these symptoms, take immediate action.






