Administration

Sept. 28 marked one year since Hurricane lan

Sept. 28 marked one year since Hurricane Ian devastated much of Charlotte County, causing tens of millions of dollars in damages, including to numerous county facilities. According to the Florida Office of Insurance Regulation, residents and business owners filed 105,714 insurance claims for storm damage. More than 13,000 of those claims are either still open or policyholders have not yet been paid.

Since Oct. 1, 2022, the Community Development Department has issued 77,086 permits.

including more than 32,000 roof permits. County street signs are being replaced as parts and repair firms become available. More than 80,000 street signs were damaged or went missing during the storm.

Charlotte County is also working through insurance and facility repairs. Three major facilities, including the Mid-County Regional Library, the East Port Environmental Center and the Charlotte Sports Park, are still not open due to damage or repair work. The sports park will

be ready for spring training February 2024 and the library will be repaired, but no decision has been made yet on whether the environmental center will be repaired or torn down and rebuilt.

The former Cultural Center of Charlotte County buildings were significantly damaged, too. It is being assessed to determine the scope of the damage and whether or not it is feasible to repair part of all. 



Real Estate Services - Surplus Sales


Real Estate Services recently completed the disposal of former Fire Stations #2 and #5. The construction of new facilities rendered the former stations surplus to County needs. Fire Station #2, formerly located at 1493 Collingswood Boulevard, generated \$341,800 and Fire Station #5, located at 26287 Notre Dame Boulevard, generated \$426,401. Both of these properties were sold in a sealed-bid process in coordination with the Purchasing.

On October 10th, the Board will be presented a high bid of \$356,300 for the former Fire Station #10, located at 101 Gasparilla Way. If approved, these three sales will generate \$1,124,501 combined. Since 2002, and including the three fire stations noted above, Real Estate Services has generated over \$13.5 Million in surplus property sales.

TWO LARGE PROJECTS BREAK GROUND IN PUNTA GORDA AIRPARK

Balentine Builder Services' custom countertops and cabinetry business broke ground on their project in August. The main building is 50,000 square feet and will include 11,250 square feet of showroom and office space. The second 15,000-square-foot building will be used primarily for warehousing.

Facilities FY23 Numbers:

In FY23, 4,029 work orders were created to be completed by Repair/Maintenance and Operations staff. These are work requests needed by BCC departments and elected officials. Of these, 628 were storm related.

The small projects group completed over 400 work orders classified as small projects. These may involve multiple disciplines, include extensive work, and take significant time to complete.

Coincidentally, jail staff received and completed the same number of work orders (4,029). These work orders are submitted though the Sheriff's system and staff supports maintenance and daily operations at the Charlotte County Jail.

Project Managers worked various stages of capital projects, sales tax projects, and hurricane related projects.

Security staff managed badge access. cameras, and locks for the County.

Business Services staff managed 278 pool vehicle reservations and answered nearly 32,000 calls last year from citizens who were not able to determine their selection through the auto-attendant.

Mutual Aid

Charlotte County was recently added to the Hurricane Idalia major disaster declaration. The amendment to add our county allows residents affected by Hurricane Idalia to apply for individual assistance from FEMA.

While our county and residents dealt with isolated flooding from rain and storm surge, our neighbors in north Florida felt the full brunt of the storm as it made landfall, leaving the small county governments reeling from the damage and tired from the sheer amount of work it takes to begin the recovery process.

The Florida Department of Emergency Management has a robust mutual aid program in place which helps provide assistance at the government level. After Hurricane Ian, our county received help from counties across the state that were not affected by the storm. The assistance provided in the form of trained staff who were able to step into our Emergency Operations Center and help out was very appreciated. It allowed our staff to check in with their families, check on their homes and take a much needed breather from the

long hours.

This month, we were able to pay it forward and five of our coworkers and several CERT volunteers deployed to various counties in North Florida. Emergency Management Director Patrick Fuller, Emergency Management Specialists Ashlyn Gamble and Brandon Watkins, Public Relations Manager Todd Dunn, and Social Media Manager Ashley Turner all spent




