

Commission receives sales tax project updates

Staff presented updates on 1% local option sales tax projects to the County Commission on Feb. 27. Charlotte County voters have approved the 1% tax on sales under \$5,000 six times, including by 67% percent of the vote in 2020. The tax has raised nearly \$600 million since it was first approved in 1992.

The first project on the 2020 sales tax list to be completed was Phase 2 of the Family Services Center on Gibralter Drive in the Parkside area

of Port Charlotte. Staff also reported the final project on the 2014 sales tax Tier 1 list — a multiuse path along a section of Kings Highway — has been completed. In addition, surplus funds from that extension were allocated to the Supervisor of Elections warehouse project. The facility design is complete and construction is expected to be finished in the spring of 2025.

As work on the design of 2020 projects has progressed, staff reported to the board construction costs have risen dramatically. The budget for the supervisor's facility has been revised from \$4.7 million to \$8.8 million. The budget for the CharlotteCounty Sheriff's Office administration and 911 dispatch center has risen from \$19 million to \$45 million. The increases may determine whether funding is available for the five proposed projects on the 2020 Tier 2 list.

The sheriff's District 2 office and training center, which is under construction at the site of the demolished old county jail on Airport Road. Construction is expected to be finished next summer.

The county has acquired property for the new Fire & EMS Station 17 and the Station 6 replacement. Property acquisition for the Station 3 replacement will be in the station design contract.

Three park projects are in design, including G.C. Herring Park, Phase 2 of the William R. Gaines, Jr. Veterans Memorial Park and Port Charlotte Beach Park recreation center and pool. Construction is expected to be completed on the pool in spring of 2025, the recreation center in the summer of 2025, and the other two parks later that fall.

County hosts Leadership Charlotte for Government Day

Charlotte County partnered with the City of Punta Gorda to host Government Day for the Leadership Charlotte Class of 2023-24 on Feb. 22. Class members toured the Emergency Operations Center and got an look at the Airplane Rescue and Fire Fighting prop on

the Public Safety Campus.

Public Works displayed its fleet of specialized equipment and the class learned about mosquito control efforts. At the Family Services Center, staff from Human Services and Utilities provided insights into department operations and facilities, including an upcoming expansion of the water reclamation facility at the East Port Environmental Campus. The day ended with tours and presentations at the city's Public Safety Building.






Grants Management





WELCOME TO THE NEIGHBORHOOD' CHARLOTTE COUNTY INDUSTRIAL AREA IS GROWING

Charlotte County attracted plentiful new commercial developers and companies in 2023, continuing the county's growth trend of the last several years. Most of the building activity is taking place within industrial areas surrounding Punta Gorda Airport, as much of the rest of the county's land is zoned for residential use, and the land that is zoned commercial outside the airport area has insufficient acreage to support large-scale projects. "Charlotte County never had facilities for manufacturing, Dave Gammon, Charlotte County Economic Development Director, said, "so if a manufacturer wanted to build in Charlotte, they would have to be real estate developers first."

That is changing, especially around Punta Gorda airport, where developers are constructing buildings on spec. "So, now these manufacturing companies can come and not have to play the real estate game," Gammon says. "All they have to do is lease the space they want and start doing their manufacturing." Family Services Center Phase 2



A Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony and Open House was recently held in celebration of the opening of the second building for the Family Services Center complex. Located within the Parkside community, the Family Services Center is a collaboration among government and non-profit agencies working together to provide an integrated client service delivery system as a holistic campus approach. Human Services staff moved into this new 18,500-square-foot phase two building, along with multiple non-profit organizations including the Boys & Girls Club of Charlotte County. In addition to a large indoor multi-purpose area for youth services, the project also consists of outdoor play areas, a community garden, and a flexible courtyard gathering space. The project was designed by Fawley Bryant Architecture and was constructed by Tandem Construction. This project was completed on time and within the \$10.9 million budget.


The shell build-outs for **Fire Station 9 and CCSO District 5** in Babcock Ranch have been finished by Kitson Partners and the County will soon start on interior finish work. The CIP project is expected to be completed and in service by January 2025. Total interior build-out cost for both buildings is \$7,021,716.





Construction of the new **CCSO District 4** office on Airport Road is proceeding with the completion of the building footers and stem wall installation. Foundation plumbing and roof drains are being installed with electrical conduits to follow. This 20,000-square-foot sales tax funded facility costs \$13,132,151 to build and is expected to be completed by June 2025.

On February 27, the Board awarded Schinkel Shultz the design portion of **Fire Stations 3, 6, and 17**. The construction manager at risk for these three projects was awarded to Wharton-Smith.

Be Prepared For Wildfire Season

With Florida experiencing a twelve-month wildfire season, preparation is key to ensuring the safety of homes and communities. While the most active period typically spans from December through June, wildfire activity peaks during March, April, and May. In the face of such threats, adopting FireWise practices becomes imperative for residents living in woodland areas.

During wildfires, the primary concern is safeguarding homes from the advancing flames. Despite the intense heat, proper precautions can ensure that structures remain standing. The mantra to remember in such situations is simple: "Be Ready, Be Firewise."

Implementing proactive measures can significantly reduce the risk of property damage and loss. Clearing debris, leaves, and flammable vegetation from the vicinity of structures, such as decks, sheds, and trailers, is essential. Additionally, maintaining a defensible space around homes by trimming vegetation at least 30 feet away can hinder the spread of wildfires. Ensuring multiple evacuation routes is crucial in emergencies. Having two ways out of the neighborhood can be a lifesaver if one route becomes impassable. Moreover, regular maintenance tasks like cleaning gutters and downspouts of debris can prevent embers from igniting combustible materials.


Preparing emergency supplies and belongings in advance can expedite evacuation processes and mitigate panic during crises. A well-equipped emergency kit should include essentials such as water, non-perishable food, medications, important documents, and a first-aid kit.




