
County launches My Neighborhood page





Fleet - partnership



Family Services Center Phase 2



Design is complete for the Family Services Center Phase 2 with the recent completion of bid documents received from Fawley Bryant Architecture. Phase 2 consists of a new 18,500 square foot building constructed adjacent to the recently completed building on the Family Services Center complex. The new building will accommodate youth services, plus general office and support spaces for community partners and Human Services Department staff.


The site will have a community garden, outdoor play space, and a flexible courtyard. Tandem Construction, the Construction Manager, is preparing the Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP), which is anticipated for the Board of County Commissioners approval this fall. Pending approvals and permitting, construction is scheduled to begin before the end of 2022.






1,800 sq ft of space was prepared at 1050 Loveland Blvd. including lobby reconfiguration, removal of fixed workstations, wall repairs, painting, and cleaning throughout the premises.

- Plans for recommended repairs to the Live Oak Point Boardwalk were sent to the contractor for review and pricing.
- Placida Boat Ramp Expansion permits were submitted to FDEP and the U.S. Army Corp of Engineers and are pending review.

- ◆ Programming for the Supervisor of Elections Warehouse is complete with the schematic phase of design beginning. The building will provide space for Supervisor of Elections, Emergency Management, CCSO, and Facilities.
- Weiler Engineering submitted the first segment of a three part Task Assessment Report for the mitigation of erosion resulting from storm impacts at Live Oak Point and Allapatchee Parks.













"Partners In Crime" Team Building at the Family Services Center

Last year, Human Services has started a new tradition for office training which they have now extended to their non-profit partners the Family Services Center. Throughout the month of July, staff planned for a full day (Aug. 8) of presentations and "Top Secret" activities to foster an environment of learning and team building. Throught the day guest speakers and some of our fellow County colleagues provided everyone with great information, useful examples and a good dose of inspiration and fun.

Dr. Joe Pepe from the Department of Health presented on Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES). Participants learned about the lasting impacts (mental/physical health and general well-being) that traumatic childhood experiences have on individuals and how we can become stronger advocates for our community through education and best practices.

Michael Raposa, CEO from St. Vincent De Paul's Cares, St. Petersburg, FL, explained that his organization is a long standing, national non-profit committed to ending homelessness. Throughout his Powerpoint he explained the socio-economic differences between Poverty, Middle Class and Wealth and how understanding the behaviors associated with each, can help us guide clients to a more stable way of living.

Their 'Partners in Crime' team builder event, took a large group of 60+ people and split them into teams of 4 that were tasked with breaking codes and identifying clues to solve an important mission. 





3 Month Comparison of Clients Served by Division



JULY 2022 Department Numbers







Home Fire Safety

Home fire safety is your responsibility. Every home should have working smoke detectors that can alert you if your home begins filling with smoke. If there is a fire in your home, you could have less than two minutes to get out safely, so every second counts. Three out of five home fire deaths result from fires in properties without working smoke alarms.

Choose interconnected smoke alarms, so when one sounds, they all sound. Put smoke alarms inside and outside each bedroom and on every level of your home. Make sure your smoke alarms work. You and your family are not safe if they can't or don't hear the smoke alarms. Test smoke alarms monthly and replace batteries at least once a year. Smoke alarms do not last forever and should be replaced every ten years.

In the event of a home fire, every second counts. Make sure you have a fire escape plan. You can draw a simple map of

each level of your home showing all the doors and windows and discuss the map with everyone who lives with you. Using your map, plan two ways out of every room and choose a designated meeting place outside where your family will meet. Get low to the ground and go under the smoke to your exit if you must escape through the smoke. Make your fire escape plan around your abilities. If you need to use a wheelchair or cane, ensure you can get to it easily and quickly. If you wear hearing aids or eyeglasses, put them next to your bed while sleeping.

Make sure all doors and windows open easily, and practice your escape plan with a home fire drill at least twice a year. If a fire is in your home, get out and stay out. Never go back inside for people, pets, or things.

Cooking was the leading cause of reported home fires and injuries in 2015-2019 and the second leading cause of home fire deaths. If you have a cooking fire, just get out, close the door behind you to contain the fire, and call 9-1-1. For an oven fire, turn off the heat and keep the door closed. Keep a lid nearby when you're cooking to smother small grease fires by sliding the lid over the pan.





UNDER CONSTRUCTION

- SR 776 Sewer Force Main Project: Upsizing the existing sewer force main to 12-inch and 16-inch lines along SR 776 from Biscayne Drive to the Charlotte Sports Park. This is an in-kind project for the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) Consent Order.
- Ackerman Septic to Sewer Project: Construction of a wastewater system to service approximately 2,135 properties with sewer service. Zones 1, 2 and the vacuum station are currently underway. Crews are working on the water main replacement throughout the project area. Zone 1 sewer connections are expected to begin this fall.

- Deep Creek Sewer Force Main Project: Construction of a larger sewer force main to improve transmission capacity for the Deep Creek neighborhood. Crews are working on Phase 2 of the project. Crews are restoring the work area along Rio De Janeiro Avenue. Various intersections along the project route are scheduled to be repaved this month. **Project Map**
- Sewer Lift Station Generator Project: Installation of stationary and mobile generators at our major sewer lift stations throughout the county. This project will allow lift stations to continue operations during storms and events when power is lost. All stationary generators are being installed at the 500-year flood elevation.
