

Milton storm debris collection operation now underway

Recovery efforts are underway in response to Hurricane Milton in Charlotte County. Clearing and removing storm debris is a major part of the recovery effort. Charlotte County Public Works asks for residents' cooperation to properly separate storm debris by category and adhere to the collection guidelines.

Property owners must bring debris to the curb and properly separate it. Your cooperation will ensure that the community recovers as quickly as possible. Residents should sort storm debris into the following six categories and place the piles in

The info hubs are white newspaper stands clearly marked Info Hubs and they contain printed flyers of updated information on recovery efforts, relief programs, and resources available to assist residents and businesses impacted by the storm.

the county-maintained roads and rights-of-way, ensuring they are off the road and not on private property:

- Construction and Demolition Materials
- Non-recyclable building materials (e.g., drywall, asphalt shingles, plastic sinks/tubs, floor tiles, etc.)
- Non-recyclable building contents and personal items (e.g., carpeting, rugs, furniture, clothing, etc.)
- White Goods
- Large household appliances such as stoves, refrigerators, freezers, washing machines, and



dryers. Please ensure refrigerators are free of any food waste when placed curbside.

- Vegetation
- Includes trees, limbs, brush, and leaves. Please note that crews will not enter private property to collect or remove debris.
- Electronic Waste (E-Waste)
- Discarded electrical or electronic devices intended for refurbishment, reuse, resale, or recycling through material recovery.

Charlotte County has an online Self-Reporting Storm Damage system to help us collect damage assessments. Visit www.tinyurl.com/reportingdamage, enter your address, select the type of damage and add a photo. If possible, include high water marks when reporting damage.


Please follow all safety guidelines for flooded areas when taking photos, stay on higher ground, avoid contact with flood waters, and do not drive on flooded roads. Reporting damage in this system gets the information to county departments quickly and eliminates the need to call it in.



William R. Gaines Park Kayak Launch


The construction of the kayak dock at the William R. Gaines Veteran's Memorial Park has reached completion. This project enhances the park's recreational offerings by providing a dedicated access point for kayaking enthusiasts, allowing for a seamless experience on the water. The dock features sturdy materials designed for durability and safety, ensuring visitors can enjoy their time in the park while honoring the legacy of local veterans. Community members can now look forward to more opportunities for outdoor activities, fostering a greater appreciation for our natural surroundings.

The newly constructed kayak dock and ramp at Gaines Park remained intact and sustained no damage following Hurricane Helene. Damage Assessments from Hurricane Milton are underway.



- The shortlisting for the Cultural Center's master planning took place on September 9th. The current facility, located at 2280 Aaron St. in Port Charlotte, suffered extensive damage during Hurricane Ian. Therefore, Charlotte County has requested the services of a design consultant team to provide professional design, master planning, and programming services for a future facility.
- The Sheriff's Admin and 911 Facility Area B Slab on Grade has been poured. Panel pours are now taking place weekly until all are completed. Construction of storm system continues. Additionally, a gravel base road was constructed to ease access for crane operators and other trades.
- The framing of interior walls, electrical roughing, and new windows are being installed at the Sheriff's District 4 Headquarters Training Facility. A fluid weather barrier is being applied to exterior walls, the roof has been dried in, metal decking is being installed, steel fireproofing, and the core fill of the block walls has been completed.

Hurricane Helene

Hurricane Helene made landfall as a powerful Category 4 storm on September 26, not only wreaking havoc on our state but also cutting a large swath of destruction across many states and leaving catastrophic and deadly floods in her wake.

Closer to home, Hurricane Helene brought a historic storm surge to our county and left many residents with hard-learned examples of why it is so important to heed the mandatory evacuations issued by emergency management.

Once the tropical force strength winds subsided across Charlotte County and it was safe for emergency services to resume, first responders were busy answering calls for service. The early morning hours of September 27 were mostly filled with water rescues as people found themselves stranded and stuck in the rising storm surge. Charlotte County Fire, Englewood Fire and Punta Gorda Fire Departments each did around 60 water rescues across the county, working side-by-side with mutual aid partners from CCSO, Fish and Wildlife, and state urban search and rescue groups. Once the storm passed and the waters receded, Charlotte County Public Safety, along with the county, switched to recovery and clean-up mode. Unfortunately not much recovery would be possible because Charlotte County found itself in the cross hairs of another storm.



Ackerman Septic to Sewer Project:

Construction of a wastewater system to service approximately 2,135 properties with sewer service is underway. Zones 1 and 2 and the vacuum station are operating, and Zones 1 and 2 sewer connections have begun. AckermanProject.com

Hillsborough Boulevard 8-inch Water Main Project:

This project is installing an 8-inch water main along Hillsborough Boulevard from Yorkshire St. to US 41. The water main will be installed parallel to the Peace River Manasota Water Authority's 42-inch Phase 28 Pipeline. Construction of the 8-inch water main is underway. The Utilities Department reminds motorists to always remain alert and to exercise caution when traveling near construction zones.

East Port Water Reclamation Facility Expansion

This project includes expanding the current water reclamation facility to treat six million gallons of wastewater per day to nine million gallons per day. The project also includes advanced wastewater treatment, which is a valuable addition to the treatment process to ensure treated water has as low concentrations of nutrients as possible. Construction is underway.
