

Monthly Report June 2025



State Budget Includes Funding for Charlotte County Projects

The state budget Gov. Ron DeSantis signed recently included a number of allocations for Charlotte County projects.

The Ackerman wastewater project received \$2 million. Ackerman is the third phase of the County Commission's septic-to-sewer master plan. When completed, it will replace 1,300 aging septic systems.

The county's flood monitoring and response network project received \$2.5 million. This project, conceived by Water Quality Manager Brandon Moody, will install remote sensors to monitor, measure and transmit real-time data on water levels in key tidal areas like the Myakka River, Charlotte Harbor and Lemon Bay. The project will enable the county to track exactly how much water is coming in and how fast it's moving.

The South Gulf Cove lock tender house project received \$6.1 million. The tender house will replace the temporary facility currently staffed by the Public Works Department. The new tender house would enable staff to better monitor the existing lock and a proposed parallel lock if that project moves forward. The new tender house would also improve visibility for spotting manatees in an around the lock area, where they are at risk for getting injured or killed.

Two intersection hardening projects received \$2.5 million. The new traffic signals at Education Way and Murdock Circle and Education Way and Cochran Boulevard will improve the resiliency of the road network in an extremely busy part of the county that is home to two schools, a technical college, the school district headquarters and the county administration center.

The budget includes \$825,000 for a high-water rescue vehicle for the Public Safety Department. The rescue vehicle will improve the county's ability to reach residents in flooded areas. The storm surge caused by hurricanes Helene and Milton highlighted the need for equipment that can operate before storm water recedes. This vehicle will also serve as brush truck to allow more resources to help during our busy brush fire season.

Charlotte County has been recognized with 31 2025 Achievement Awards from the National Association of Counties. The awards honor innovative, effective county government programs that strengthen services for residents.

These NACo Achievement Awards demonstrate the dedication and commitment of my colleagues to delivering exceptional service to our commu-

nity. Even as we're still recovering from the terrible storms we endured in 2024 and before, county staff showed resiliency and innovation by creating new programs, leveraging technology to improve productivity and employing best practices to deliver programs and services.

The awards were spread across seven departments, which reflects how broadly our culture of delivering exceptional service permeates the organization. Congratulations to all who played a role in the programs and services recognized by the association.










NACO Award - Real Estate Services In June 2025, Real Estate Services was awarded the NACO award for 'Storm Site Planning and Usage'. With two hurricanes hitting Charlotte County within a few weeks of each other, the need for site location increased drastically. In addition, we had to identify areas not impacted by surge impact zones. With the rapidly changing dynamics if the storms and their impact, identifying the sites to be utilized became imperative. Our task to identify sites, obtain owner approval for site use, and communicate our findings to Emergency Operations was ramped up tremendously. We identified approximately 75 sites to be utilized by both internal and external agencies. This allowed for the consolidation of resources and condense responses to geographic areas with the most impact. We also utilized

the new real-time GIS map of site management/usage to track the locational needs


Ribbon Cutting Charlotte County Sheriff Office District 4



This state-of-the-art center is designed to prepare new deputies with the latest equipment and resources, including a physical fitness gymnasium, hand-tohand combat training areas, a K9 station, and a multi-purpose training space that can accommodate up to 100 people. The opening of this facility marks a significant step forward in strengthening public safety and enhancing community security. As our community continues to grow, this modern training center will help ensure our deputies are well-equipped to meet the evolving challenges of law enforcement in the 21st century.




- Fire Stations 6 and 17 are both progressing well and moving into the design development phase. Johnson Engineering, the civil engineer for both projects, is submitting the Site Plan Review (SPR) applications for both sites.
- The Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) has approved the deduction of 0.04 Forested Saltwater credits from Little Pine Island Mitigation Bank, applying them to the Ainger Creek Park Renovation Project.
- The recovery project for Hurricane lan at the Mid-County Regional Library is progressing. The roof replacement, along with the installation of gutters and downspouts, has been completed, with only the atrium enclosure remaining. Ductwork installation is underway in preparation for the delivery of the HVAC units. Additionally, drywall installation is in progress, with finishers and painters working closely behind the drywall crews.












Emergency Management:




Fire & EMS:
