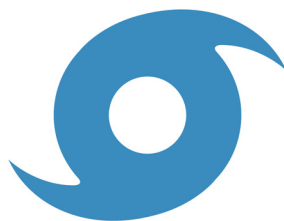

Hurricane season ends with no U.S. storm impacts

The Atlantic hurricane season concluded on Nov. 30 with no tropical impacts anywhere in the United States. According to Emergency Management Director Parick Fuller, this season was the first since 2015 with no landfalling hurricanes in the U.S.

“The final tally was 13 named storms, five



becoming hurricanes, of which four were major Category 3 or higher. There were three Category 5 storms, though nearly all the activity occurred far out to sea. Outside of the U.S., Hurricane Melissa devastated Jamaica as a strong Category 5 storm,” Fuller wrote in a message to county staff on Monday.

He also conveyed his appreciation for all the preparation, training and awareness throughout the season.

I want to echo his gratitude to all residents who remained vigilant and prepared. The readiness you, your families and organizations embraced ensured we could respond to any tropical event and recover. Emergency Management will continue to monitor year-round for any hazard that may impact our area.

County staff contribute food, cash for neighbors

Charlotte County employees conducted two food drives, one at our employee appreciation dinner in October, where staff donated more than 3,300 pounds of food, which was distributed to the community at the Human Services Department’s Family Services Center. A second food drive ended Nov. 21 in time for the items donated to help families enjoy a Thanksgiving dinner. Staff donated 2,000 pounds of food

The Community Development Department’s Annual Chili Cook-Off fundraiser on Nov. 21, raised \$520 for families in need this holiday season. The Community Services Department has a Food for Fines program through which library patrons can have their late fee fines forgiven by donating food. Last year, it collected 20,009 food items

Sales tax focus group reviews parks projects

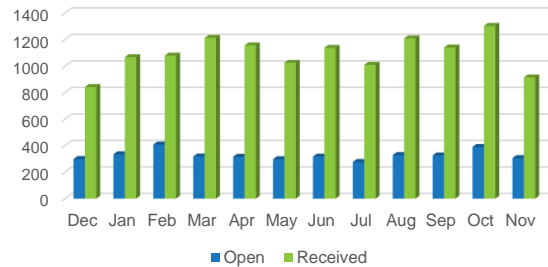
The Sales Tax Focus Group held its sixth meeting on Oct. 30 where it review parks and recreation projects, including additional proposed phases of the Bissett Park and William R. Gaines Jr. Veterans Memorial Park expansions and replacements for the Tringali Community Center and the former Cultural Center of Charlotte County.

Panelists were provided backgrounds on the proposed projects, including design and construction estimates and status updates.

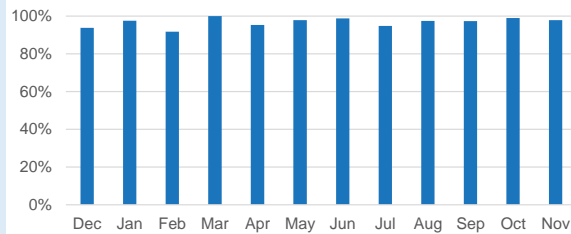

Service Tickets by Month

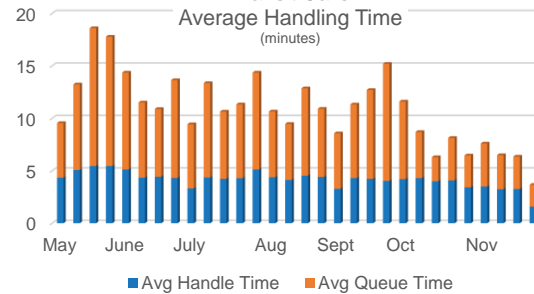

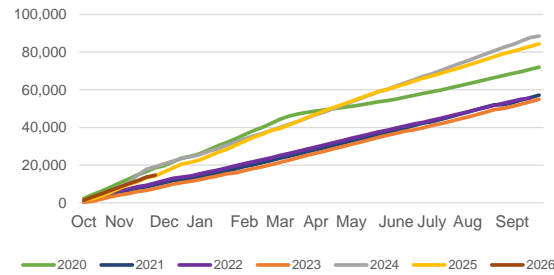

Property Tax Impact Analysis

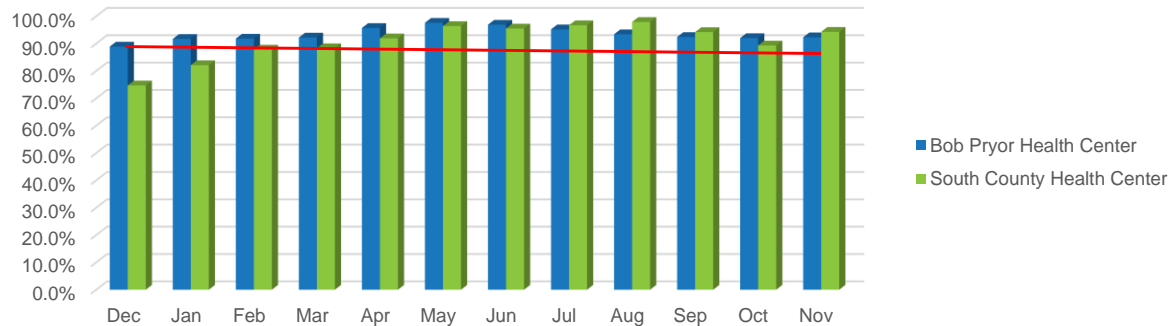
Fiscal staff conducted a detailed financial analysis of eight Florida House Bills related to property tax reform, assessing how each proposal would affect local government revenues and budget planning. Their work included estimating potential revenue losses, evaluating changes to taxable values and exemptions, and identifying long-term fiscal impacts. This analysis provided a clear understanding of the financial risks and budgetary adjustments Charlotte County may face if the legislation is enacted.

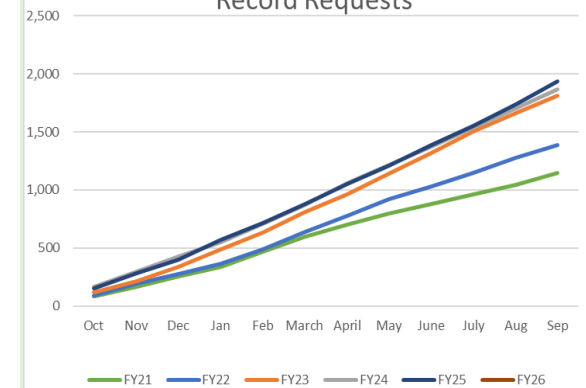

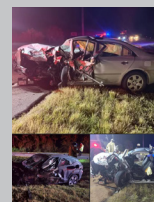

Current Plat Applications in Review

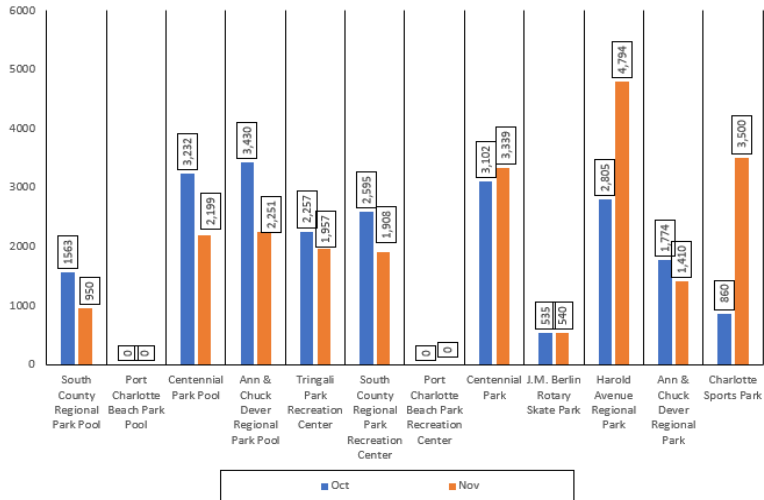
PFP-25-17: Wilmington Land Company is requesting Preliminary and Final Plat approval for a replat of Lots 11-53 and 87-119 of Heritage Station, as recorded in Plat Book 26, Pages 11A through 11I, of the Public Records of Charlotte County, Florida, to increase the number of units by 12 for consistency with the approved Major Modification to the PD Final Detail Site Plan. Wilmington Land Company is also requesting approval of a Construction and Maintenance Agreement associated with this plat. The site contains 14.93± acres and is generally located north of Yacht Club Boulevard, south of River Birch Court, west of Burnt Store Road, and east of Jolly Roger Boulevard. The proposed subdivision is in the Punta Gorda area and in Commission District II.

PFP-25-16: Lennar Homes, LLC is requesting Preliminary and Final Plat approval for a subdivision to be named, Tuckers Cove – Phase 4. The proposed subdivision is a replat of a portion of Tract F-1 of Tuckers Cove, as recorded in Plat Book 27, Pages 7A through 7Z48, of the Public Records of Charlotte County, Florida. They also seek approval of a Construction and Maintenance Agreement and surety to cover the construction of the plat infrastructure. The site consists of 584 residential lots and 12 tracts. This site contains 129.74± acres and is generally located south of Bermont Road, north of White Pearl Rd, west of the County line with Glades County and east of SR 31, inside the boundary of the Babcock Ranch Community Development of Regional Impact (DRI) Increment 2, in the East County area, and in Commission District I.

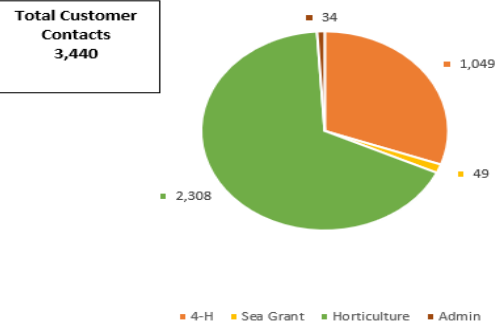
PFP-25-14: The Crosswinds (f/k/a Simple Life) is requesting a Preliminary and Final Plat approval for a subdivision named Crosswinds that consist of 122 single-family units, site landscaping and supporting utility, roadway and stormwater infrastructure. They also seek approval of a Construction and Maintenance Agreement and surety to cover the construction of the plat infrastructure. This project site is 68.43± acres and is generally located North of Duckweed Terr, South of Scham Rd., East of Burnt Store Rd. and West of Green Gulf Blvd. The proposed subdivision is in the Punta Gorda area, within the boundary of the Burnt Store Area Plan area, and in Commission District II.

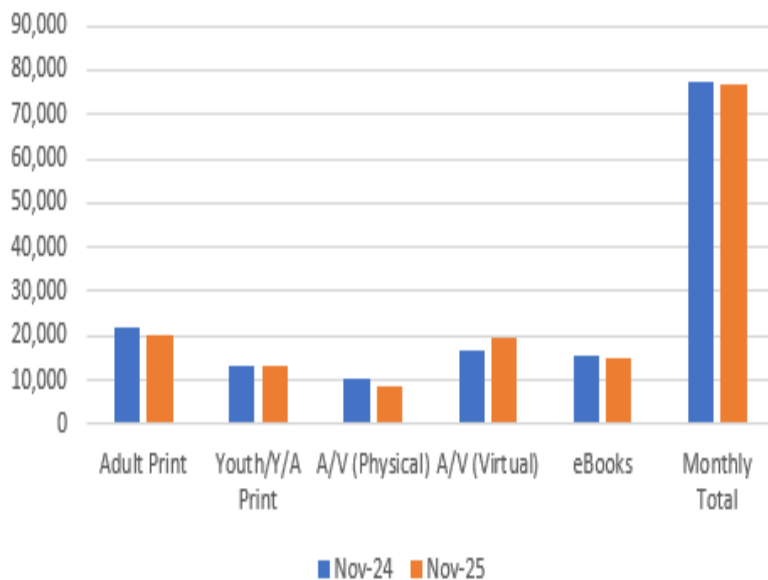

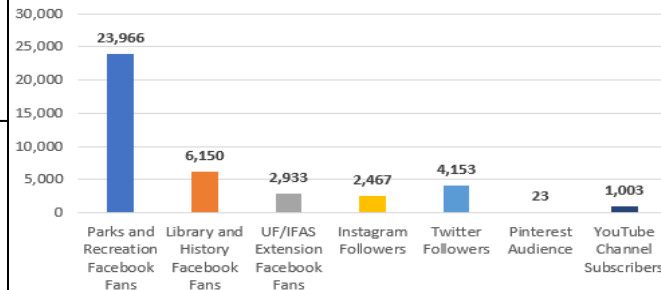

Placida Boat Ramp Expansion

The Placida Boat Ramp expansion project is a 2014 Sales Tax project that has undergone many required revisions due to the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) permitting requirements to reduce impacts to marine life, seagrass, and coastal mangroves. With the changes made to the site plans, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection (FDEP) approved the revisions and issued the Environmental permit in November of 2025. The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) has also approved the changes, issuing a public notice of permit issuance that will run for 3 consecutive weekends starting November 30th in The Daily Sun newspaper.



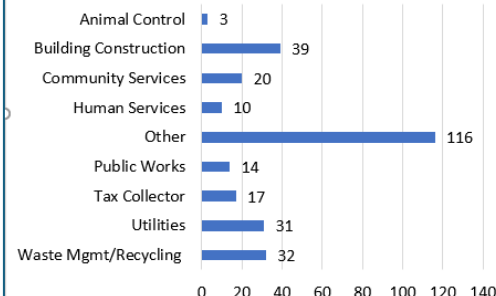
The Board of County Commissioners approved the construction amendment detailing the guaranteed maximum price (GMP) for Phase I of the G.C. Herring Park Project during their meeting held on November 12, 2025.

Harvard Jolly submitted a schematic design proposal for the Emergency Operations Center Expansion project, which was accepted by the project team and stakeholders. We are now entering the design development phase, which is expected to take around 2-3 months.

Following the kickoff meeting held on November 18th, the design for the Bayshore Phased Improvement project has begun. The project will enhance drainage, replace the grass parking with pavers, and add diagonal parking areas to better accommodate larger vehicles.

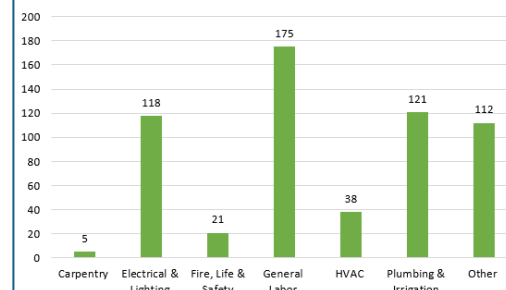


FY26 Switchboard Calls November 2025 Total Calls - 282

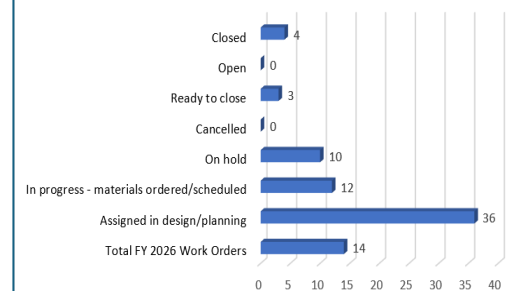

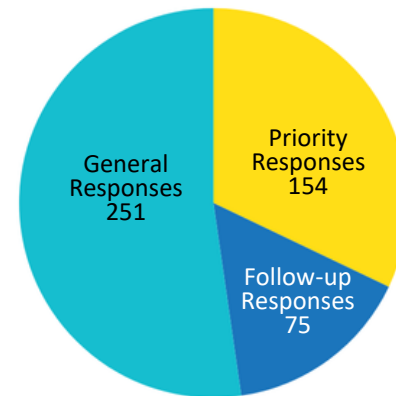
Fire & EMS:

Animal Control:

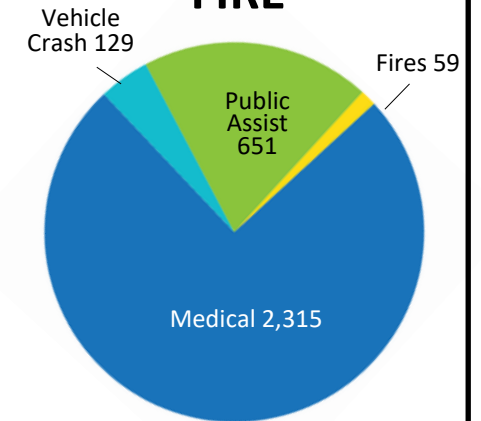

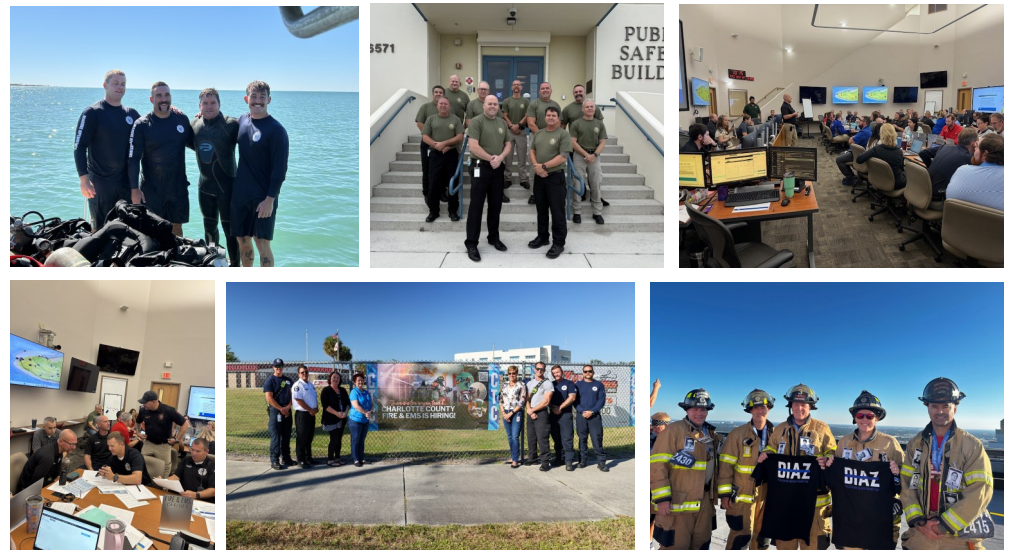

Hillsborough Boulevard Water Main Project



You may notice slower moving traffic along Hillsborough Boulevard approaching Toledo Blade Boulevard. We're working with the Peace River Manasota Regional Water Supply Authority to upgrade infrastructure.

CCU University



We're happy to have new faces in the department! During CCU University, a utility-focused orientation for new employees, staff got a behind-the-scenes look at how different areas work together to serve the community.

UNDER CONSTRUCTION

Burnt Store Water Reclamation Facility Expansion

The Board of County Commissioners approved a consultant's recommended design to temporarily increase wastewater capacity for this service area. The Commission also supports a permanent expansion of the facility.

Ackerman Septic to Sewer Project:

Serving customers in mid-county, this project improves infrastructure reliability with a wastewater collection system to service approximately 1,300 properties with sewer service, new water service lines and a vacuum station that will provide sewer collection. [AckermanProject.com](#).

Hillsborough Boulevard Water Main Project:

This project is installing an eight inch water main along Hillsborough Boulevard from Yorkshire Street to US 41. Multiple lane shifts are in place at the intersection of U.S. 41 and Cranberry and Cornelius Boulevards for pipe installation.

East Port Water Reclamation Facility Expansion

This project will expand treatment capacity from six million to nine million gallons of wastewater per day. As part of the upgrade, advanced wastewater treatment technologies are being incorporated to enhance the removal of pollutants in wastewater. Construction is currently 73% complete.

To provide safe, reliable drinking water, reclaimed water and wastewater service for the enrichment of the community.
